Another Hope Children's Ministries (AHCM) is registered by the Ugandan Government (S.5914/8153) as a Christian Non-Profit Organization. AHCM, the community, and her partners continue to work tirelessly to bring hope to children and families. Vulnerable children are given love and care in a Christian environment.

The challenges facing children, youths, and families continue year after year. The effects of these problems grow in numbers and become more pronounced as the years go by. Rural poverty, lack of parenting skills, unstable families and loss of a parent are some of the many factors that adversely affect the African child. The pain is evident in the faces of children, youth and parents or guardians alike.

The children are deprived of the basic necessities of life such as education, good food, safe water, accommodation, health care, a home and family security. Their future is at stake; some are thrown out of home, while others run away in hope of a better life. Due to the cultural setting and other setbacks like early marriage and teenage pregnancy, the girl-child is more vulnerable than her male counterpart.

Interventions to improve the child's welfare are inevitable. AHCM has maintained the education-sponsorship program for a number of youths who would otherwise have dropped out of school. A vocational school has been established to teach skills to the youth for job-placement and self-employment. AHCM continues with other programs such as water life, family support, farming, arts & crafts and self-improvement. These programs benefit the vulnerable children and youth either directly or indirectly.

During the year, water tanks have been constructed for both families and schools under the water life project. The youth enjoy safe water at home and at school, and are freed from the burden of fetching water. Skillful parenting seminars have improved the parent-child relationship. Self-improvement seminars have enabled the women and youth to realize their value. Their homes have become a better place to stay, and the influx of children to children's homes and nearby urban areas have been reduced.

We are grateful to all of you for the financial, material and physical support that has enabled the vulnerable children to enjoy a better life during the past year. The loving hearts and helping hands of the volunteers have greatly influenced the children's lives, memories that will never be erased. The commitment of the staff for the betterment of the children is a legacy to which no monetary value can be attached.

Lastly, we wish to thank you for all the support when Ruth was expecting our little boy. Today he can sit up and sip a cup of porridge unsupported. Our heart-felt thanks to you all. Your financial, physical, and moral support has made all these interventions possible and touched lives for the better.



BACKGROUND OF ANOTHER HOPE CHILDREN'S MINISTRIES (AHCM)

1.1 Introduction

This is our 2017 Annual report and it highlights the major activities that happened in the year. Another hope children's ministries (AHCM) is a Christian nonprofit organization that is registered by the Ugandan government (S.5914?8153). AHCM is committed to bringing hope through providing love and care in a Christian environment to orphaned and vulnerable children. The majority of the children we serve are orphaned, abused, abandoned or reported missing.

Our major focus is in the districts of central Uganda such as Wakiso, Mukono, Luweero and others. The children are supported through various strategies such as providing water source for a family and helping a family to become self-sustainable.

Ms. Nambowa Ruth Bulyaba had a vision for this ministry in October, 2015, and it all started because of her challenging childhood upbringing and wanting to give back to God.

1.2 AHCM Objectives

- 1. To provide accommodation, food and clothing to the orphans and abused children in a family like environment.
- 2. To provide preprimary, secondary and vocational skills for imparting market-oriented skills to enable self-sustainance.
- 3. To modify children's behavior
- 4. To take care of the children's health.
- 5. To help the staff and parents/guardians to better provide for the children.

1.3 Vision and Mission

Vision: to improve quality of life for the vulnerable children in Uganda through education, accommodation and health care in a Christian environment.

Mission: to bring hope to orphaned and abused children in the district of central Uganda by providing love and care in a Christian environment.

1.4 Over view of different activities/projects

We had various activities and projects that we undertook for example activities that were aimed at child protection and legal support, water life projects, and self-esteem projects. In addition, the Finance and Administration of AHCM are handled in a very accountable way. Because we would like to break the vulnerability cycle of the children, we do activities or projects that are geared to this.

PSYCHOSOCIAL SUPPORT AND BASIC CARE

2.1 Child Protection and Legal Support

2.1.1 Children served

The total number of the children served at Another Hope Children's Ministries (AHCM) in 2017 was 1,122 and this includes those that were served by either one Core Program Area (CPA), like Education or Healthcare, or more than one CPA.



2.1.2 Children Served by CPA

Most (33%) of th children were were served with Health, Water and Sanitation, followed by those who (29%) were supported with psychosocial support and basic care and the least were those supported with child protection and legal. During the year we had a dental camp that targeted children, water tank constructions in both schools and homes and lots of water filters were distributed in both schools and homes.



2.1.3 Children on AHCM continuous support program

For the children/young adults who are on AHCM support, the total we served was 121 of which 73% were staying in familes in the year 2017 as shown in Fig 2.2 below. We encourage children to stay in families because the family is the first line of response and instituion care should be the last resort.




Fig 2.1 AHCM Children served by residence

The majority (65%) of our children/young adults served were female as girl child is more vulnerable in Uganda and Africa atlarge due to so many factors like earky marriages and traditional beliefes that still take girls as less valuable to the family they are born in. We served children in particularly seven Districts of Uganda and these were Kampala, Kayunga, Buikwe, Wakiso, Luwero, Masaka, Kiboga and Mukono of which the largest (57%) of those served were from Wakiso District simply because this is where AHCM is located and it started rolling out to other Districts.

Followed by Mukono District (21%) because AHCM runs a number of community projects in this District in addition to children that are on our sponsorship program. And the minority (0.3%) of those served were in Kayunga District (these were children that relocated from Kampala to Kayunga District)

2.1.4 Children Received by AHCM in 2017

We received a total of 3 children, 1 boy and 2 girls. They were from Wakiso, Mukono and Masaka Districts.

Alehadro was found and rescued from the streets of Naalya where he was staying with his mentally challenged mother.

His mother was taken to the National Mental Referral Hospital in Butabika for Rehabilitation and treatment. He was referred to the Uganda Child Helpline (Sauti), which brought him to AHCM through the Probation and Social Welfare Officer of WakisoDistrict.

He is now staying at AHCM and we are planning to enroll him in school the year 2018 if his family is not traced by that time.

2.1.4.2 Namuyaba Daizy

Daisy Namuyaba is the first born of six children born to Nabbanja Jane and Kyeyune Ferisiko the residence of Kabanga Parish, Mapata subcounty, Mukono District. Daisy's parents are alive and their main source of income is farming, which can not avail them with enough income to raise money to look after their family.

Daisy being the first born of the family, and after she dropped out of school, they looked for help from AHCM to get educational support so that she could support the siblings as well.



It was in that situation that AHCM had to help Daisy and take her back to school. Without AHCM's help, Daisy would have probably become a teen mother.

With the gift of education from AHCM, she will be able to focus on Education and not get married as a teenager something that many teenage girls are facing in the country right now.

She is now in her First year at Congswell School of Beauty Art and Design doing Tailoring and Fashion Design. Daisy loves her course and she dreams to become one of the best fashion stars in Kampala.

2.1.4.3 Namukwaaya Mariam

Namukwaaya Mariam, 13 years old, was found and rescued from the streets of Wakiso Town when she was going to her brother's place which she could not allocate.

She was taken to Wakiso police station by the Boda man, the police took her to Wakiso District Probation and Social Welfare Officer who referred her to Another Hope Children's Ministries.

She was temporary accommodated at the AHCM children's home as we embarked on



searching her family. We successfully traced her family and we resettled her back, the grandmother was very happy to receive her granddaughter back because she had lost hope.

2.1.5 Children's Meeting and Debates



All the organisation activities are held on the principal of child participation with children being given space and room to participate which raise their confidence, have self-esteem and be able to talk out their issues which helps out in the smooth running of activities and serving the best of these children.

Through the meetings and debates, the children are gaining the self esteem they need so at AHCM, we ensure that we have these two things emphasized.

2.1.6 Feeding of the Accommodated Children



In the year 2017, we also managed to feed our children three meals a year.

We were able to feed them well because we do farming which provides in addition to what we buy.

Thanks for all who are supporting us with funds for feeding. The children fed on a variety of food such as beans, meat, chicken, cassava, corn flour, Sweat potatoes, fruits to mention but a few.

2.1.7 Resettlement

Resettlement is one of our vital activities that take place through out the year. We follow the government policy that children should not be taken away from their parents and guardians if they are willing to stay with them. We as well respect the saying that "Home is the best place for a child" We therefore go through all the procedures of home trancing, home visits, counselling guidance enganging guardians, before deciding to resetlle back the child. This help us to bond the child and the guardian as we still continue to do constant home visits. This year 2017, we resettled back a total of 7 childen with their families, as shown below, and to AHCM this was a great success.

2.1.7.1 Khaleed Muzeeyi



My name is Nakato Jalia resident of Katooke B I in Wakiso District. I am the biological mother of Khaleed Muzeey. I also have three other children. When my son Khaleed got lost in January 2015, we immediately started a search. We went to the police, announced he was missing on community radios as well as other public radios.

However, we could not find my son that day. We searched for a year and gave up because we thought he was sacrificed, since that year many children were being sacrificed by witchcraft practitioners.

However, on 8th March 2017, my husband had gone to the police for some family disputes and that's when he saw a notice with our son's name and photo. He came home and told me, and then I went and informed my sister Hajati that my son had surfaced. We went back to the station and checked and indeed he was the one pictured in the notice.

We quickly called the number which was on the notice and we found ourselves in the Probation and Social Welfare Office of Wakiso District. The officer contacted the organization called Another Hope Children's Ministries (AHCM) to bring our child to her office on an agreed date which was 9th March 2017. When we saw Khaleed being brought in, I felt extremely happy, and I could not believe that it was truly my son because all along I thought that he had died.

My heart was always troubled, but now my life is at peace. I look at my children when they are sleeping in the house and I thank God for He is Mighty. My children are all present although we are not financially stable, but my heart is at peace. I am no longer anxious as I used to be before we found Khaleed. I thank AHCM for looking after my son for the two years they had him.

2.1.7.2 Kalungi Eriya

My name is Ssalongo Kasule Wilson, a residence of Kongonje village. I am a father to six children. In 2014, we transferred from Zana to Kongonje where we are staying now. A few months later my son Eliya went missing with a boy called Ssetwabule who was a residence of that same village. I looked for my son day and night. There is a pitch in the next village where kids could go and play soccer every evening. I did the same thing every evening. I could go and sit and wait to see if my son would be among them, but no, this wasn't the case.

There is also another big town called Kakiri. It has a very big town center, so I could also go there every evening but still did not see my son. I stopped working; I stopped farming; my life went backwards. First of all I am HIV Positive, so I got very ill and I was bed ridden for about a year. My other son, Eliya's brother, told me, "Dad let's go again and try to look for Eliya" We searched again but all in vain. I went bankrupt. I sold my house to get money to look for Eliya.

We tried every means: the witch doctors, friends, police, local councils, but I never got my son. I gave up. I actually thought he was sacrificed in ritual sacrifies because that year he went missing, child sacrifice was very common.




Eliya (facing front hugging his brother, his step mum sitting and Bena, The AHCM social worker and Daniel, one of the AHCM Directors standing during resettlement.

I can't express enough how I am so happy to get my son back. When I went to Another Hope Children's Ministries (AHCM), they told me that he was at school, and I couldn't go there to see him until the next day. I just can't believe that my son is back in my life. Even when I go to work, I make sure I come back early to meet him. My health has improved a lot because I am the happiest man ever.

God Bless Pastor Roen, Madam Bena and every one at AHCM who helped me find my son. Kalungi Eliya's background: He was declared missing by the Wakiso Police and referred to AHCM on 23rd December 2015 by the Probation and Welfare officer of Wakiso District. He was resettled with his family on 27th April 2017. He is still under AHCM support for his education.

2.1.7.3 Referal: Muwanguzi Charles Kizza



In this month of June, we were able to tranfer one of our little boys Muwanguzi Charlse Kizza to SOS after staying with us for four years after he was abused by the mother together with his three sisters who were taken to SOS a children's care institutio.

After several fruitless efforts put together to look for other guardians who can stay with the boy, the Probation and Welfare officer advised us to take him to SOS so that he can be re-united with his sisters.


2.2 Education

Out of 121 children who were on our sponsoreship program, 97% were of school age, and 96% were able to attend school. The few that failed to attend school it was because of lack of funding for those that were joining vocational school because the cost of vocational education had raised so much and one it was because of another reason.

2.2.1 Kabuye Andrew



Kabuye Andrew, 3 years old, joined AHCM when he was around 10 months after being found abandoned and then referred to us by Nansana Police station through the Probation and Social Welfare officer of Wakiso District.

Andrew was very vulnerable and in a very bad condition, he was given all the necessary support and he got well.

This year 2017 Andrew started his first year of school and he is very happy to go to school every day with the other kids at Another Hope Children's Ministries.

2.2.2 Ssebugwawo Julius



Ssebugwawo Julius, who is 18 years old, has been with AHCM program since 2014. His parents separated and the children were left with the mother, who had to take care of him together with his other siblings. Since the mother has a rather low income, she could not afford to pay his school fees and other needs that is why she looked for help from AHCM.

Julius did his finals in National Examination for the first 4 years of high school in 2016 and in the year 2017 Julius was able to join Sai Pali Institute of Technology and he is attending courses in Hardware and Networking. He is so happy that he is attending courses that he is passionate about.

2.2.3 Final Academic Year 2017 Students

Every end of the year, we happen to have candiates that sit for National Examinations and this year we had 7 candidates that set for National Primary Leaving Examinations, 2 set for National Examination that complete 4 years of high school and we pray for them and ask God for them to come out with good results. We will get to know their results in the year 2018.

2.2.4 Final Acadmic Year 2016 Students

In the year 2016 we had 10 cadidates that sat examination of different levels. Their results were released in the year 2017 and we are grateful to God that they all passed their exams and they were able to join the new levels of education. Thanks to all that supported these children.



2.2.5.1 Nassali Leticia



She with a certificate in Fashion, Art and Design at Michael Angelo School of creative Art. Leticia joined AHCM in 2006, after she had lost both her parents and has been at AHCM for more than twelve years and it is much pleasure to see Leticia has been growing up into a fine focused person.

She will be joining to study one more year so as she attains a Diploma in Fashion, Art and Design still at the same institute. Thanks to all of you that have supported Leticia right from 2006. May God greatly bless you.

2.2.5.2 Nawaati Stella



Stella, joined AHCM in 2014. She was found missing in Wakiso Town Council. She had left her home, because her mother had sold her as a house maid at the age of 12 year. AHCM with the help of the Wakiso District and Busheni Probation and Social Welfare Officers, Stella was able to be rescued from child labor at the age of 14 years.

And AHCM saw that Stella got justice and she gained back her rights as a child, taken back to school and in this is year, 2017, we have been blessed that Stella graduated with a certificate in hair dressing from Gayaza Technical Institute, this is such a great impact to our children which improves their lives hence

exit from their vulnerability status. Thanks to the sponsorship rendered to children as Stella, otherwise, they would have been stuck in child labor and perhaps become mothers at a very young age.

2.2.5.3 Ramathan Mulindwa's Story

Ramathan Mulindwa, who is 19 years old, joined AHCM in 2013. His parents are both alive though they are separated. His father left his mother and went to Hoima, so Ramathan stayed with his mother in Nansana, Wakiso. Since the father was not having a job, he was not able to support the family and since 2004 never provided any help and Ramathan and his siblings have not seen their father since then. The mother was also not able to pay the school fees and providing the basic needs for Ramathan and his two siblings. Due to her low income, she could not afford having Ramathan at school. Since 2013, Ramathan has been able to go school and this year he has finished a 3 year Certificate in Plumbing at Kisubi Vocational Institute. He is waiting for graduation.

2.2.5.4 Olivia Nabuuma's Story

Olivia has joined AHCM in June 2013, when she was 15 years old. Her mother, Namatovu Juliet and father Katongole Denis were separated in 2002 and afterwards she took the children to Kasato, where she stayed with the maternal uncles' side. Due to some Epilepsy disease and the high school fees, the mother decided to take the children to the paternal grandparents where Olivis was sexually abused by her own father and neigbours helped to rescue her by informing the police in the area they were in. Her case was reffered to the Probabtion and Social Welfare Officer and that is how she joined AHCM. She took a course in Hair dressing and cosmotology and graduated with higher grades.

2.2.6 Academic Evaluation




Uncle Filip an intern student from Sweden talking to a Teacher at Kireka School for Phisically and Handcapped.

On a quartely basis, we conduct academic evaluation. This is an exercise, where we follow up on our children at their schools and check on the perfomance, school environment and others important things. This helps our children emotioanally and helps them to perform better to make sure that issues that might cause academic failure can be solved. Also the Organization Management uses the information to make decisions on which schools to continue working with.

2.2.7 School Visitation

For all accommodated children who attend boarding school, we happen to visit them in the middle of the school term. We visit them to serve them a special meal with a drink and add them some more snacks that can take them throughout the other part of the school term. It was a pleasure for us to check on our children to see how they are doing at school and which challenges they face and how we can help them have a comfort stay at school.







2.4.2. Ssenabulya Mark



We also had Mark Ssenabulya, one of the children at AHCM have had his second operation on his left knee at CORSU hospital in Entebbe. Mark had his two legs broke when he was four years old.

He has to undergo several surgeries until he gets better. His next operation is in the year 2018 on February 28th. We request for prayers and financial support towards him to see that he improves steadily.

2.5 Recreation

2.5.1 Birthday Celebrations





We are happy to report that we were able to celebrate birthdays of most of our children who are accomodated at the AHCM's home.we see so many children happy when their birthdays are celebrated. Many of them had never had a birthday celebrated. We celebrated the birthday of two sisters Hanifah and Habibah Komugave in the end of 2017. Their parents separated in 2012 and the two children, Habibah 2 years and Hanifah only nine months old, were brought to AHCM in a very vulnerable and bad health condition. In December 2017 they celebrated their 8th and 9th birthday. We are glad to see how far God has brought these children.

2.5.2 Parties and Outings

We at AHCM, we value the happiness of our children. Seeing them smile gives us joy. Some of the ways we make them happy is having parties and taking them out. We are grateful for the support we always get from our friends and supporters, especially the outside volunteers. God bless you so much.

2.5.3 A Night to Remember Party



One might ask why Another Hope would spend the time and money on celebrations that seem fairly extravagant for a third world country. I believe that poverty is not just about lack of money and opportunity. It is also largely about self-esteem and not understanding our heavenly Father's love and concern for each person. One of the best ways to instill in a person a sense of worth is to celebrate them and show them that they are worthy of being treated special.

After all, our heavenly father sees each of us as special and unique. Through raising the self-worth of those around me I hope to increase their hope for the future, reduce child abuse and introduce my students and neighbors to a loving God who wants only the best for each of his special creation.

The two events that Another Hope put on, which were privately funded by special friends, helped us to reflect God's love for each person who attended. Both were great successes. The first event was a prom for older students at Another Hope that we called A Night to Remember.

Many of our students go onto college and interact with wealthier students who come from more privileged homes. By giving our children the experience of a high school celebration, our students are more likely to feel that they can relate better to their more educated, wealthier peers.

It also was designed to boost their confidence and provide practice feeling comfortable in a formal setting. We hired someone to do makeup and hair, rented tents, hired a cook and make a special meal. The second event was a woman's day event where local woman were invited to a special luncheon where men were the servers.

Their husbands could attend as long as they agreed to serve their wives (which rarely happens in this culture). Most of the woman who attended have never been served by a man in their lives. Their self-worth is lacking and they often pass on their low self-esteem to their children through abuse and neglect.

Our goal was to help them realize how much God loves them and made the special so they can better love and care for their families. We prepared a special meal (served by husbands and community men), hired a special musician and gave presentations centered around family issues

The following stories give insight as to the impact of these events: 2.5.3.1 Nalwanga Beatrice




2.5.3.2 Kayondo Elvis

2.8.2 Suzan Obrien's story






3.1.2 Stories from Volunteers

3.4.1 Filip Sjöling



04 THE PROJECTS

Hard work and commitment have always been a characteristic of Another Hope Children's Ministries (AHCM) and her partners in ensuring improved wellbeing for the vulnerable children. It is my pleasure to present to you this Projects Section Annual Report which details the progress and contribution made by AHCM together with her partners in Uganda through our project activities in the districts of Wakiso and Mukono. Equally, many new communities and institutions were taken as part of the beneficiary fraternity of AHCM's work.

This report provides milestones of AHCM's work implemented in the year 2017. This period was very eventful and busy as the organization participated in a number of key program events. The report further highlights a number of lessons learnt which include community engagements, and improvement of Water Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH) service provision in needy areas and mainstreaming of Equity and Inclusion in our work.

4.1 Community Development Projects

AHCM is involved in different communities in the Districts of Wakiso, Mukono, Kampala, Kiboga and Luwero. The major community projects that are undertaken are water life, family support, and self-esteem, as well as Economic Empowerment and Positive Discipline and Skillful Parenting.

4.1.1 Water Life Project

Achieving water, sanitation and hygiene for all does not require rocket science, but rather dedication, political will, financial priority and above all walking the talk in recognition of the fact that sanitation and water is a fundamental human right and should be prioritized as essential services alongside health and education.

It is incomprehensible that in this era, 1 out of 9 people in the world still lack access to safe water. Lack of sanitation is the world's leading cause of infection and it all starts with having no access to water. AHCM continues to enable vulnerable communities through various water sanitation and hygiene solutions including handing out of water filters, and construction of rainwater harvesting, in order to improve their access to safer water.

We empower communities and engage them in their problems and the solutions we offer. We focus on not creating dependence. We integrate awareness into our solutions so the recipients understand the reality of these developments, cultivating best practice. We share knowledge as we secure their human rights to water and sanitation.

By December 2017 working in the Districts of Mukono, Mpigi and Wakiso in Uganda, AHCM constructed 29 rain water harvesting tanks in total, 24 in households and 5 in schools that continue to provide safer-drinking water to mainly rural communities and schools. Because of these water accomplishments, children living in households and at schools are drinking from an improved water supply system.

4.1.1.1 Water tank Construction in Family Households

The transformative impact of access to water has resulted in improved health outcomes for families with children. AHCM's inclusive approach also ensures that access to water is extended to those families, who face challenges due to disability and old age. AHCM constructed 24 water tanks in some of the most vulnerable families.

Improved access to water is complemented by community hygiene and sanitation training to raise awareness of and promote action to prevent waterborne diseases. Water tank construction is helping in a lot of ways, from provision of safety and clean water, helping children have time to play and also to concentrate on their education. In Uganda, the burden of fetching water entirely lies on the children as young as 3 years.

4.1.1.2 School water tank construction

Poor sanitation in schools impairs children's growth and development. It also limits school attendance, retention and negatively affects pupils / student's ability to concentrate and learn. In light of the foregoing, AHCM continued to support implementation of school initiatives as an excellent opportunity to create life- long behavior changes.

The AHCM school initiative provides insights into how children can be effective sanitation and hygiene change agents. This is guided by assumption that what children learn at school, they can transfer to their homes, communities and to other children. While on the other hand, these children will later become parents and will be duty bound to provide a safe and clean environment for their own children's development.

The key components of the school Water life initiative included provision of sanitation and hygiene facilities (10,000-15,000 litter Water Tank, cleaning equipment, 120 Litter Water Filter, Sanitary pads handout to girls and Bible distribution); formation of School Health Clubs, awareness creation for school pupils on acceptable sanitation and hygiene behaviors, trainings for School Management Committee and Parents and Teachers Association members in appreciating and planning for sanitation, and community awareness.

During the year 2017, AHCM reached 5 schools. Two primary schools, two secondary schools and one Vocational school.

The impact of no water on-site means that school children spend hours each day not in class, but travelling by foot to collect water for cleaning, cooking and washing at the school, this is the same thing they do at home before and after school, making it hard for them to have enough rest to concentrate on their education.

Story from a secondary school student:

It is early morning, I need to wash my face, brush my teeth and bathe in preparation for classes. As I lift my bucket I am almost in tears. Somebody had stolen all my water in the night. I had walked a stretch of about 2miles to get this water. I had to beg for some little water from a friend. It was not enough but better than nothing. Lunch is late, some boys are shouting at the cook. Poor man, it is not his fault, the water was not enough. One hour of the afternoon classes is interrupted. This was a routine at least twice a week. We could not cover the syllabus.

The life-changing moment came when AHCM visited our school and constructed a water tank. Life will never be the same. We have enough time for studies, our meals are on time, sanitation and hygiene has improved. The naughty boys who used not to bathe have no excuse today. I enjoy school, my grades have improved, my future looks brighter. My spiritual life has benefitted too, I read my Bible every day. Thanks to AHCM for the blessing.

4.1.1.3 Sustainability and ownership of Water Sources

Sustainability and ownership of water sources was enhanced through supporting the establishment of functional Water User Committees; by the end of the year 5 committees were trained in roles and responsibilities. Facility caretakers were trained in carrying out preventive maintenance thereby increasing functionality of water and sanitation facilities in place. This has not only strengthened school management structures but it has as well improved information flow and timely responses from the pupils to the school management. The composition of the water-user committee consists of 2 pupils, 2 teachers and 2 parents, all led by the Head Teacher.

4.1.1.4 Water Filter Handover






Photos of the Water filter handovers.

Water filters were handed over to the five schools by the Deputy Director of Another Hope Children's Ministries. This was done to ensure availability of safe water for all the learners and will reduce on the expenses spent on buying firewood for boiling water because the filter does not need boiled water. The pupils and staff were taken through a water filter maintenance training so that it can be utilized very well by the learners. With provision of these water filters, there will be reduction in a number of cases of water borne diseases, especially typhoid that is so rampant. When students are healthy, they will be able to spend more time in class and hence improving their school grades.

4.1.1.5 Bible Distribution

Being a Christian based organization, spreading the word of God is at the heart of every community engagement. A total of 296 Bibles were handed out to students at Greensteds High School, Cogswell School of Beauty Art and Design, St Ludigo Gimbo Primary School, Butere Church of Uganda Primary School and St Jude Kabanga Primary School. Bibles distributed where in two languages that is English and Luganda.

4.1.2 Self Esteem Project

The Self-Esteem project is a project that is looking at increasing the esteem of adolescents and young adults in the central part of Uganda. There are a number of activities that we do under this project such as pads and bra distribution, life skill talks and reproductive health talks.

4.1.2.1 Pads distribution

Across Africa, unsanitary school environments and inadequate sanitation facilities remain a physical barrier to education for the world's poorest children, especially girls. Girls are also faced with the further challenge of managing their menstrual cycle. Without underwear, sanitary towels or a place to wash or change, girls are likely to stay at home when they get their period. What starts off as a few days of absence each month can snowball quickly, resulting in girls falling behind in class, high exam failure rates and subsequent dropping out of school. AHCM's initial response is to distribute sanitary pads as well as carrying out hygiene and sanitation training for students. Target communities and schools receive sanitary pads and trainings. These activities contribute to a positive educational environment, conducive to learning and development.



Also, we had a community camp for all girls to come and receive pads at the AHCM office. 251 pads were distributed to 251 girls. All pads were donated by our partners; Hope BLit., an organization in California, USA and HUGS, an organization in UK.

4.1.2.2 Reproductive Health Talks

We had reproductive Health trainings that were done by professionals. They talked about how to handle reproductive health issues, menstruation and how to handle everything. Furthermore, they informed about avoiding getting pregnant. The major message was abstinence until marriage.

4.1.2.3 HIV Counseling and Testing



During this activity 302 people were counseled and also tested for HIV. This was a great opportunity of having many people around the community test for HIV.

The woman had trainings about parenting, they have been shown movies on how to manage parenting. Furthermore, they had discussion to share information among themselves on how to handle the family, the children and all related issues.

4.1.3.1 Economic Empowerment Training

This was done by a group of volunteers from the USA and it mainly focused on woman engaging in productive work, mindset change and saving money. From the trainings a group of 19 women was formed to engage in savings and loan. The loan association is now effective.

4.1.2.4 Positive Discipline and Skillful Parenting

These women continued to be equipped with skills in parenting. It came to our notice that many of these women had challenges in parenting their children and hence having a team of Christian women from California, USA that trained skills on parenting. Many children that end up in children's homes it is because of lack of skillful parenting in their homes/families. If such skills are imparted in the parents, they will be able to handle their children and these children will nor escape from their homes.

4.1.2.4. Women's Day Celebration Event

In 2017, Women's day was celebrated in style, local women and men were invited to a special luncheon where men were food to their wives. Their husbands could attend as long as they agreed to serve their wives (which rarely happens in this culture). Most of the woman who attended have never been served by a man in their lives. Their self-worth is lacking and they often pass on their low self-esteem to their children hrough abuse and neglect.

Our goal was to help them realize how much God loves them and made them special so they can love and care for their families better. We prepared a special meal (served by husbands and community men), hired a special musician and gave presentations centered around family issues.



We were blessed by the guest of Honor, Hon Nabbossa Subugwawo (green & pink Buganda attire). She encouraged women to be creative and responsible no matter the situation and urged them to train up their children in a way that honors God and them.

Mr. Ssenyonga Ali's story



My name is Mr. Ssenyonga Ali, I am 57 years old and live close to Another Hope. I participated in the women's day and it was a good experience for me. First of all, I saw people united and happy together which is rare in my world. Everyone was very cooperative and friendly. I got to know many people whom I didn't know. People came from all around this area. Never having attended school myself, it was pleasure for me to interact with people who are were educated. It also gave me happiness to serve my two dear wives (being a Muslim I marry more than one wife). Both wives sat at the same table. When I started serving I had to decide whom to serve first, knowing the other would feel slighted. Suddenly I had an idea. I picked up two plates full of food at the same time (rather than one like the other servers) and I served them at the same time.

The crowd gave me a loud applause for my quick thinking. It was such fun for my wives and I. I thank God for Aunt Ruth and Uncle Dan for having organized such a wonderful moment.

Story of Najjuma Swabulah

I am married with 4 children. My experience with women's day ceremony may a little different from what others experienced. We live close to Another Hope Children's Home. We have had very little interact on with anyone associated with the home. The women in my community have talked often about how this organization was Christian and didn't belong in a Muslim community. From the time, they moved in we never liked them. The Director Ruth was thought to be a cold, uncaring woman who was not like us and cared little for us. We thank God for this day because we actually got to know the true Madam Ruth and the true heart of her organization.

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4.1.2.5 Women's Movie Evening

We had an evening where the women were able to watch a movie entitled 'War Room'. The movie is about a woman, whose husband cheated on her husband. The woman and her husband had a daughter, but the husband could not spare time to spend time with his child. The woman resorted to praying which changed her husband's habits and he became a good husband and father. The movie was shown to tell the community women how strong praying can be to help them solve so many challenges they face in life. They were so much touched by this movie and many we interacted with told us how the movie taught them the power of prayer.

4.1.5 Other Community Projects

4.1.5.1 Gospel outreaches

We are grateful that we had the opportunity to host different Christian volunteers who helped to carry out the Gospel outreaches in two schools that is Jayden's Kinder and Daycare and Cogswell's School of Beauty, Art and Design. Also Bibles were distributed during the Gospel outreaches.

4.1.5.2 Men's Workshop

Men's conference on father involvement in parenting

After observing many successful women's events, Mr. Daniel, one of the Directors at Another Hope Children's Ministries, decided that it was time we had a men's conference. AHCM had two great men visiting, Mr. Richard Cogswell and Pastor Jon Hartzler. They agreed to facilitate a conference speaking and our topic was father involvement in the life of a child. We had much positive feedback after the conference and below is a story from one of the fathers.

A father that was impacted by the conference

I would like to thank Another Hope for thinking about us men because all previous conferences were done for women. When I received an invitation to attend the men's conference, I asked myself what they were going to tell us. I finally decided to attend. This was the first time I have heard any discussions with other men on things to do with upbringing of children. When I am with my friends, we usually discuss money and politics. Things to do with children are for women. I was very surprised to be taught about issues in married life because it was my first-time hearing anything like this. We were advised how a good father should treat his family members and others.

Here is what I learned from the conference. I realized that I have to be involved in my children's lives. I need to always ask God to help me raise my children better and to help me reverse the influence of my upbringing on my behavior. Growing up I never had any chance of having discussions with my father. I only had conversations when he was punishing me. I came out of the conference with knowledge and assurance that I can be there for my children.



4.1.5.3 Dental Camp

We had a dental camp organized in corroboration with HOPE -BLIT an organization from California. A total of 2005 children and adults attended and they received free dental checkup, oral hygiene training, and each participant received a toothbrush and toothpaste from Colgate.

At the end of the camp all those who worked during the dental camp received certificates of appreciation from the HOPE-BLIT team. These included the staff of AHCM, Hope-Blite team community volunteers and distinguished individuals and organizations from the community who included the VHTs, LCs and schools.

4.1.4.4 Mental Health Workshop

We were blessed during the end of the year to receive Ms. Lynn Freeman from Scotland who had a skill in mental Health. Together with her, we organized a workshop about mental health to help equip the community members with knowledge to recognize and respond to mental health problems in the community or their families. Members were taught about, depression, anxiety, and the misuse of alcohol and drugs and the signs to look for in order to identify someone with such issues. The major aim of the mental health training is to reduce stigma, promote help seeking, and improve recognition and response.

4.1.4. Sustainable Skills and Empowerment for the Youth Project

At the Cogswell school of Beauty, Art and Design, we do want to see self-independent individuals through the skills we are giving them. That is the reason that we do so much that can help these individuals gain the skills they need in life. To see that students, have much time to practice and gain the skills, we managed to have clean and safe water for the students. Before, the students would spend considerably spend some amount of time to fetch the much-needed water at the school and also could hardly have safe water for drinking.

We are grateful that through your support, a water tank was constructed that can harvest 15,000 litres of water and also a water tank filtration system that helps filtrate drinking water for the students. A Hair dressing student, narrated how relieved she was from the burden of fetching water for her hair dressing course activities. She said fetching water would take a long time as they would walk distances to look for this water. Now she just runs to the water tank to get the water to do the tasks assigned to her by her instructor and she is happy to spend more time learning than running around for water.

She was also very excited with the fact that now there is safe drinking water. She said she has access to drinking water at any time and she does not worry about falling sick any more. She said thanks to all who think about the poor young girls like herself. She couldn't imagine what would life mean to them without supporters like you and because of you she is confident that they now have a future.

4.2 AHCM Children's Home sustainable Projects

These projects are aimed at supporting and maintaining the children's home that the AHCM runs.

4.2.1 The Farming Project

Farming involves growing of food crops such as maze, beans, sweet potatoes, cassava for children's consumption and rearing of animals

4.2.1.1 Crop Husbandry

We managed to engage in farming during the year. Weeding and harvesting of food crops like maize, cassava, beans from the farms went on in the farms of Namuzikiza, Njagalamwenge and Busiika. Items such as bisagazi for the cows have been acquired from the farm thereby saving us from purchasing planting materials. It has also helped us save money.

We are glad to report that during the year we realized much food from the garden and this helped cut down our food expenses. By the close of the year, we had so much food harvested and also in the garden that was to be consumed the year 2018, so we predict a much drop down in the expenses towards food.







We like to appreciate the children's efforts and the volunteers such as Dustin, Filip and Monique for the participation in farming.

4.2.1.2 Animal Husbandry

The livestock has been so challenging. We did not have much yields from the milk and we lost one calf and the cow, we butchered it because it had aged and had challenges. However, we benefited from the cow dung that was used as manure in our gardens and this manure boosted our crop growth. We are hoping to increase our efforts in taking care of the livestock next year so as to have better yields.

4.2.2 Safe Project

4.2.2.1 Construction of the Incinerator



We had an incinerator constructed in an effort to reduce on the waste volumes that were accumulating at AHCM and to reduce on the landfill space at AHCM. The incinerator is estimated to reduce waste by 80-95%.

Also with this equipment, we are sure that the environment will be clean for the children and health problems will not be a threat.

4.2.2.2 House Painting





We continued to have the beauty of the children's home improved. With skills from volunteers and our young adults, we managed to do painting 3 times in the year of 2017.

4.2.2.3 Poultry project



The project started this year in 2017 with 200 chickens. The project was implemented at AHCM and the vocational school. The aim is to see that we have the nutrition of our children improved.

4.2.2.4 Art and Craft Project



This project is mainly aimed at giving the children and young adults extra skills in life and at the same time we get an extra income that is used to take care of school fees of those children who have no sponsors.

They learn different items such as paper bead jewelry and baskets. The year 2017, more efforts were put on learning how to make baskets. Even boys that thought that baskets were meant for girls managed to learn and actually they did beautiful baskets than many of the girls

Maama Halima's Story



When Nanyonga Safinah lost her husband, the hope of educating her daughter, Halima, faded. Today, Halima is a graduate of Business and Accounting. AHCM paid Halima's School Fees to the end. While at AHCM, Halima learned Arts and Crafts skills; she makes necklaces, bags, and earrings. That's how our family earns additional income to pay house rent and buy food.

Without this additional skill, Halima's salary would not be enough for their upkeep. Thank you AHCM for educating Halima and also empowering her with the Arts and Crafts skills. Thank you all who support AHCM, without your support we would starve.

4.2.2.5 Music, Dance and Drama





5.1.1 Meetings

Various meetings were conducted in order to achieve our goals and objectives. Meetings were held to set targets, solve problems and form a way forward. These included departmental meetings, monthly staff meetings, management meetings and quarterly board meetings. We are thankful to the members who organized, attended and participated in these meetings.

5.1.11 Management Meeting

AHCM Management Team is comprised of the two AHCM Directors (Executive and Deputy Director), Accountant, Assistant Administrator, the Social Worker in charge of Children's welfare, the Assistant Project Coordinator and a Care Taker. In addition, regulations mandate us to have three representatives from the Government.

These are the Wakiso Sub County Chairperson Local Council Three (LCIII), Wakiso District Probation and Social Welfare Officer (PSWO), Wakiso District Health Officer (DHO), and all those from the district in which AHCM is located. We are grateful for this team for agreeing to come to our meetings and helping throughout with their great support enabling us to operate the children's home with success.

5.1.1.2 Board Meeting

We are grateful for the AHCM Board Members, who committed themselves to serving the organization. In 2017, our major aim was to see a strengthened board that can help in various issues, which include reviewing and approving our organization's documents.

5.1.2 Staff at Ahcm

We had a team of staff members that played various roles in departments which include The Social Welfare Department consisting of the social workers, volunteers and interns and care takers. The team also included the Projects Department, which includes the Assistant Project Coordinator and farm assistants. Both departments are headed by Deputy Director of Programs in Finance. The Administration Department consists of the accountant, the assistant administrator, drivers and security guards. This department is headed by the Executive Director. We had a total of 12 staff in 2017. In 2017 we were joined by Miss Nakazibwe Margret (Senior Care Taker) and Miss Nakato Josephine (Assistant Caretaker).

We had three staff leave us in 2017. One could not cope with the Christian nonprofit organization policies. Another one left because the contract ended and was not renewed, and the last one left because she got another opportunity.

5.2 Finance

5.2.1 Sources of Finance

The total funding for 2017 was Ugx 740,673,507. As usual we realized much of our funding (63%) coming through our partner, Good Measure International in USA, which receives donations on our behalf. These funds were spent on general activities like school fees, medical and general administration of the organization. We had cases where funds sent through Good Measure were restricted to certain activities or projects, for example the construction of wells, water tanks, purchasing Bibles and water filters. Our next biggest source of funding was through Global Giving with 15 % of the total income received in 2017. The funds were for three projects: increasing access to clean and safe water at AHCM, The Sustainable Skills Development Project and The Education for All 2018. The rest of the funds are listed in the following chart.

6.1 Advocacy

She was key in raising funds for the conference that was about promoting and advocating for social and emotional vulnerable and marginalized young woman to influence positive change in the areas of gender, human rights, HIV/AIDS, and education.

During the year, AHCM participated in the exhibition organized by the Nansana Civil Society Network. The exhibition aimed at strengthening the existing relationship among partners, re-enforce networking and referral systems for proper service delivery. 

6.2 Capacity Building

As part of AHCM core mandate, AHCM with financial and technical support from her partners has organized and facilitated trainings aimed at the development and strengthening of human and institutional resources to be able to deliver quality services to the beneficiaries. Capacity building activities were conducted through different approaches including trainings and facilitating.

6.2.1 Staff Trainings

During the year, a number of trainings were conducted aimed at enhancing capacities of staff in various aspects including but not limited to reporting and fundraising. Staff attended the training that was organized by Global Giving and also those that were conducted by volunteers regarding Team work and team building.

6.2.3 Children's training

At Another Hope Children's Ministries, we believe that children's trainings are so important for the positive transformation of children. At the core of all of our programs is one very important thing: training. Training children puts them at ease, allows them to have fun, helps them to interact with their peers and tests their limits. Our approach to training -based education sets kids on a course toward brighter futures and helps make the learning last. During the year, five trainings were done for children both boys and girls from Lukwanga parish including those that are accommodated at the AHCM home. This was done by a team of volunteers from USA.

During the year, children also benefited from the waste management training, teaching them to use the incinerator which was constructed to help improve the cleanliness at the AHCM children's home.

- 7. The scorching sun which led to crop failure coupled with the worms that affected the maize and sweet potatoes.
- 8. Poor roads.
- 9. Some undisciplined children.
- 10. Staff unreliability.
- 11. Challenges with volunteers.

7.3 Recommendations
